Tune written by Jeremiah Ingalls, 1805, entitled *Delay*, for three parts and different words, in 4:4 time. This revision by Lucius Chapin, reduced to three parts, appeared in *Southern Harmony* (1835), and *The Sacred Harp* (1844-present). Some time before 1911, the tune in *The Sacred Harp* acquired an alto part unlike Chapin's.
