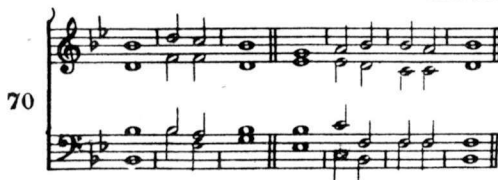


PSALM 26. *Judica me, Domine.*

- Be thou my Judge O Lord, for I have 'walk-ed' innocently : my trust hath been also in the Lord 'therefore' shall I not 'fall.
- 2 Examine me O 'Lord and 'prove me : try out my 'reins' and my 'heart.
- 3 For thy loving-kindness is ever be'fore mine 'eyes : and I will 'walk in 'thy' truth.
- 4 I have not dwelt with 'vain' persons : neither will I have 'fellowship 'with the de'ceitful.
- 5 I have hated the congregation 'of the 'wicked : and will not 'sit a'mong the un'godly.
- 6 I will wash my hands in innocency ' O ' Lord : and 'so will I 'go to 'thine' altar;
- 7 That I may shew the ' voice of ' thanksgiving : and tell of 'all thy 'wondrous' works.
- 8 Lord, I have loved the habitation 'of thy' house : and the place 'where thine 'honour' dwelleth.
- 9 O shut not up my soul 'with the 'sinners : nor my life 'with the 'blood'thirsty;
- 10 In whose 'hands is ' wickedness : and their right 'hand is 'full of 'gifts.
- 11 But as for me, I will 'walk' innocently : O deliver me, and be 'merciful' unto 'me.
- 12 My foot 'standeth' right : I will praise the 'Lord in the 'congre-'gations.

- 2 When the wicked even mine enemies and my foes, came upon me to

- 3 Though an host of men were laid against me, yet shall not my heart  
 ' be a'fraid : and though there rose up war against me, yet will I  
 ' put my ' trust in ' him.
- 4 One thing have I desired of the Lord which I ' will re'quire : even

 behold the fair beauty of the Lord ' and to ' visit his ' temple.
- 5 For in the time of trouble he shall hide me ' in his ' tabernacle : yea

- 6 And now shall he lift ' up mine ' head : above mine ' enemies  
 ' round a'bout me.
- 7 Therefore will I offer in his dwelling an oblation with ' great  
 ' gladness : I will sing and speak ' praises ' unto the ' Lord.
- 8 Hearken unto my voice O Lord, when I cry ' unto ' thee : have  
 ' mercy up'on me and ' hear me.
- 9 My heart hath talked of thee, Seek ' ye my ' face : Thy face ' Lord  
 ' will I ' seek.
- 10 O hide not thou thy ' face ' from me : nor cast thy ' servant a-  
 ' way in dis'pleasure.
- 11 Thou hast ' been my ' succour : leave me not neither forsake me O  
 ' God of ' my sal'vation.
- 12 When my father and my ' mother for'sake me : the ' Lord ' taketh me  
 ' up.
- 13 Teach me thy ' way O ' Lord : and lead me in the right ' way be-  
 ' cause of mine ' enemies.
- 14 Deliver me not over into the ' will of mine ' adversaries : for there  
 are false witnesses risen up against me, and ' such as ' speak ' wrong.

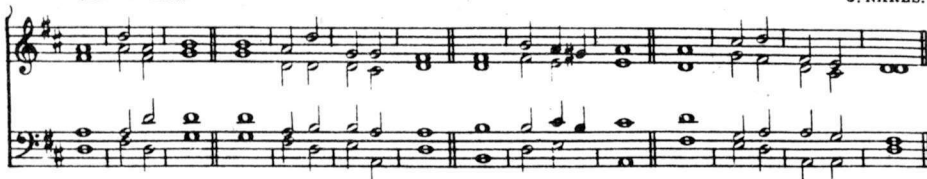

- 11 Great plagues remain' for the un'godly : but whoso putteth his trust  
in the Lord, mercy embraceth' him on' every' side.
- 12 Be glad O ye righteous, and rejoice' in the' Lord : and be joyful all  
'ye that are' true of' heart.

PSALM 33. *Exultate, justi.*

- REJOICE in the Lord' O ye' righteous : for it becometh' well the  
'just to be' thankful.
- 2 Praise the' Lord with' harp : sing praises unto him with the lute, and

'with a' good' courage.

'trusteth in 'him.

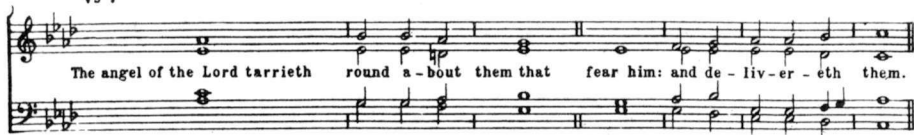
9 O fear the Lord ye that 'are his 'saints : for they that 'fear him

     ' open ' unto their ' prayers.  
 16 The countenance of the Lord is against ' them that do ' evil : to root  
     out the remembrance ' of them ' from the ' earth.

- PLEAD thou my cause O Lord with ' them that ' strive with me : and  
     fight thou against ' them that ' fight a 'gainst me.  
 2 Lay hand upon the ' shield and ' buckler : and ' stand ' up to ' help me.  
 3 Bring forth the spear, and stop the way against ' them that  
     ' persecute me : say unto my soul ' I am ' thy sal 'vation.

- 4 Let them be confounded and put to shame, that seek' after my  
'soul : let them be turned back and brought to confusion, that  
im'agine 'mischief' for me.
- 5 Let them be as the dust be'fore the'wind : and the angel of the  
'Lord' scattering' them.
- 6 Let their way be 'dark and 'slippery : and let the angel of the 'Lord  
'persecute' them.
- 7 For they have privily laid their net to destroy me with'out a 'cause :  
yea, even without a cause have they 'made a 'pit for my' soul.
- 8 Let a sudden destruction come upon him unawares, and his net that  
he hath laid privily 'catch him'self : that he may fall' into his  
'own' mischief.
- 9 And my soul be joyful' in the 'Lord : it shall re'joice in 'his sal-  
'vation.
- 10 All my bones shall say, Lord who is like unto thee, who deliverest  
the poor from him that 'is too' strong for him : yea the poor, and  
him that is in 'misery from 'him that 'spoileth him?
- 11 False witnesses did 'rise' up : they laid to my charge 'things that  
'I' knew not.
- 12 They rewarded me 'evil for 'good : to the great dis'comfort' of my  
'soul.
- 13 Nevertheless when they were sick I put on sackcloth, and humbled  
my 'soul with 'fasting : and my prayer shall turn 'into mine 'own  
'bosom.
- 14 I behaved myself as though it had been my friend 'or my 'brother :  
I went heavily, as one that 'mourneth' for his 'mother.
- 15 But in mine adversity they rejoiced, and gathered them'selves to-  
'gether : yea the very abjects came together against me unawares,  
making 'mouths at 'me and 'ceased not.
- 16 With the flatterers were 'busy' mockers : who gnashed up'on me  
'with their 'teeth.
- 17 Lord how long wilt thou 'look upon' this : O deliver my soul from  
the calamities which they bring on me, and my 'darling' from the  
'lions.
- 18 So will I give thee thanks in the great 'congre'gation : I will  
'praise thee a'mong much' people.

- 19 O let not them that are mine enemies triumph over 'me un'godly :

- 27 Let them be glad and rejoice that favour my ' righteous ' dealing :  
yea let them say alway, Blessed be the Lord who hath pleasure in  
the pros'perity ' of his ' servant.
- 28 And as for my tongue it shall be talking ' of thy ' righteousness : and  
of thy ' praise ' all the day ' long.

PSALM 36. *Dixit injustus.*

My heart sheweth me the wickedness ' of the un'godly : that there is no  
fear of ' God be'fore his ' eyes.

- 2 For he flattereth himself in his 'own' sight : until his abominable

hath left off to behave himself wisely 'and to 'do' good.
- 4 He imagineth mischief upon his bed, and hath set himself in 'no good  
'way : neither doth he abhor 'any thing' that is 'evil.

DAY 7. EVENING PRAYER.

PSALM 37. *Noli acmulari.*

- FRET not thyself be'cause of the un'godly : neither be thou envious  
a'gainst the 'evil'doers.
- 2 For they shall soon be cut'down like the 'grass : and be withered  
'even as the 'green' herb.
- 3 Put thou thy trust in the Lord and be'doing' good : dwell in the  
land, and'verily' thou shalt be' fed.
- 4 Delight thou 'in the 'Lord : and he shall' give thee thy 'heart's de-  
'sire.
- 5 Commit thy way unto the Lord, and put thy'trust in'him : and  
'he shall' bring it to' pass.
- 6 He shall make thy righteousness as' clear as the 'light : and thy just  
'dealing' as the 'noon-day.
- 7 Hold thee still in the Lord, and abide' patiently up'on him : but  
grieve not thyself at him whose way doth prosper, against the man  
that doeth' after' evil' counsels.
- 8 Leave off from wrath and let' go dis'pleasure : fret not thyself, else  
shalt thou be'moved to'do' evil.

- 8 O put your trust in him ' always ye ' people : pour out your hearts before him, for ' God is ' our ' hope.
- 9 As for the children of men ' they are but ' vanity : the children of men are deceitful upon the weights, they are altogether ' lighter than ' vanity it'self.
- 10 O trust not in wrong and robbery, give not yourselves ' unto ' vanity : if riches increase ' set not your ' heart up'on them.
- 11 God spake once, and twice I have also ' heard the ' same : that power be'longeth ' unto ' God;
- 12 And that thou ' Lord art ' merciful : for thou rewardest every man ac'cording ' to his ' work.

PSALM 63. *Deus, Deus meus.*

- O God ' thou art my ' God : early ' will I ' seek ' thee.
- 2 My soul thirsteth for thee, my flesh also longeth ' after ' thee : in a barren and dry land ' where no ' water ' is.

- 3 Thus have I looked for 'thee in 'holiness : that I might be'hold thy  
'power and 'glory.
- 4 For thy loving-kindness is better than the 'life it'self : my 'lips shall  
'praise 'thee.
- 5 As long as I live will I magnify thee 'on this 'manner : and lift up  
my 'hands in 'thy 'Name.
- 6 My soul shall be satisfied, even as it were with 'marrow and 'fatness :  
when my mouth praiseth 'thee with 'joyful 'lips.
- 7 Have I not remembered thee 'in my 'bed : and thought upon  
'thee when 'I was 'waking?
- 8 Because thou hast 'been my 'helper : therefore under the shadow of  
thy 'wings will 'I re'joice.
- 9 My soul 'hangeth up'on thee : thy 'right hand 'hath up'holden me.
- 10 These also that seek the 'hurt of my 'soul : they shall 'go 'under the  
'earth.
- 11 Let them fall upon the 'edge of the 'sword : that they may 'be a  
'portion for 'foxes.
- 12 But the King shall rejoice in God, all they also that swear by him shall  
'be com'mended : for the mouth of them that speak 'lies 'shall be  
'stopped.

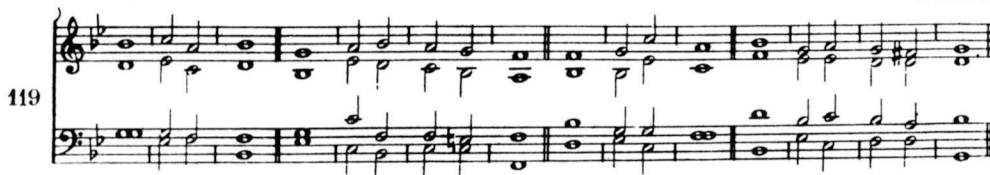
PSALM 64. *Exaudi, Deus.*

- HEAR my voice O God 'in my 'prayer : preserve my 'life from

8 Yea their own tongues shall 'make them 'fall : insomuch that whoso 'seeth them shall 'laugh them to 'scorn.

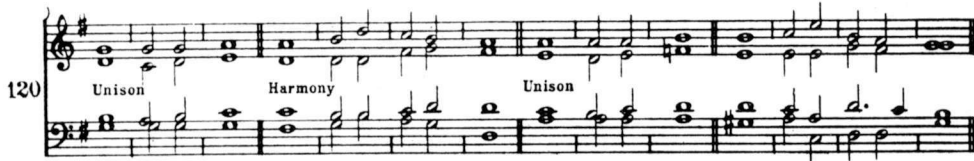

- 8 They also that dwell in the uttermost parts of the earth shall be afraid

- 9 Thou visitest the 'earth and 'blessest it : thou 'makest it 'very  
'plenteous.
- 10 The river of God is 'full of 'water : thou preparest their corn, for  
so thou pro'videst 'for the 'earth.
- 11 Thou waterest her furrows, thou sendest rain into the little  
'valleys there'of : thou makest it soft with the drops of rain, and  
'blessest the 'increase 'of it.
- 12 Thou crownest the year 'with thy 'goodness : and thy 'clouds 'drop  
'fatness.
- 13 They shall drop upon the 'dwellings 'of the 'wilderness : and the  
little hills shall re'joice on 'every 'side.
- 14 The folds shall be 'full of 'sheep : the valleys also shall stand so thick  
with corn that 'they shall 'laugh and 'sing.

PSALM 66. *Jubilate Deo.*

- BE joyful in God 'all ye 'lands : sing praises unto the honour of his  
Name, make his 'praise 'to be 'glorious.
- 2 Say unto God, O how wonderful art thou 'in thy 'works : through  
the greatness of thy power shall thine enemies be found 'liars 'unto

- 3 For all the ' world shall ' worship thee : sing of ' thee and ' praise thy  
' Name.
- 4 O come hither and behold the ' works of ' God : how wonderful he is

I will ' offer ' bullocks and ' goats.
- 14 O come hither and hearken, all ye that ' fear ' God : and I will tell  
you what ' he hath ' done for my ' soul.
- 15 I called unto him ' with my ' mouth : and gave him ' praises ' with my  
' tongue.
- 16 If I incline unto wickedness ' with mine ' heart : the ' Lord ' will not

- 17 But ' God hath ' heard me : and con'sidered the ' voice of my ' prayer.
- 18 Praised be God who hath not cast ' out my ' prayer : nor ' turned his  
' mercy ' from me.
