

Psalm 51 Have mercy on me, O God

Performance Notes

- The style of singing required by this piece is similar to that used for plainchant psalms, *ie* with a slow, deliberate speech rhythm and a gently undulating emphasis on those syllables which require it.
- The piece should be sung *legato* throughout. A comma in the text does not indicate a break in the sound. Such breaks should occur only when indicated by a rest.
- If used liturgically, verses not specified in the lectionary may be omitted.
- The opening phrase, "Have mercy on me, O God," may be sung by a solo cantor, with altos and basses beginning at "according to ...".
- The 2nd bass part in verse 19 is optional, and should be sung only if there are basses who can do justice to the final bottom E.
